Welcome, FBCS, to 2019.

As we enter this New Year together, I invite you to join me at the Table of Christ.

During this past year of dwelling in John's Gospel, we heard Jesus, full of grace and truth, inviting us into his abundant life of loving relationship - "abiding" and "oneness" - with God and one another. Now, with the Gospel of Luke and the whole of scripture as our guide, we will discover the place of the table - hosted by Jesus and open to all - in this life to which we are called.

"Jesus is either going to a meal, at a meal, or coming from a meal." This statement by New Testament scholar Robert J. Karris is on full display in Luke's narrative and reinforced by the inclusion of 15 parables featuring food. As my colleague Greg Mamula observes, "Meals were such a significant part of how Jesus went about his mission, that of all the symbolic acts Jesus could have given his followers that encompassed his identity, teaching, and mission he chose a meal." So, when Jesus joins his followers at the table and instructs them to "do this," he refers to much more than a monthly smidgen of bread and a sip of juice. He who "came eating and drinking" (Luke 7:34) is calling us to engage (re-member) him each time we eat and drink.

In this invitation to the table, the focus is being placed on learning to follow Jesus' instruction - Do This - in our daily lives and in life together. The goal? That we discover and practice the table life of Jesus, taking bread, blessing it, breaking it, and giving away what has been broken.

As people called into a life of shared abundance in Jesus, our host and guest, we will partake this year in the common course of scripture reading known as the "Revised Common Lectionary" (If you are interested in discovering more about the RCL, please visit http://lectionary.library.vanderbilt.edu/faq2.php). The FBCS preaching and teaching ministry will, accordingly, follow the Revised Common Lectionary, Year C, with Luke's Gospel in the spotlight (TextWeek.com).

As your pastor, I believe that following a shared reading pattern can be transformational. I invite you to join with believers around the globe in a schedule that involves chewing on four scripture texts each week (generally, two readings from the 2nd Testament and two from the 1st). The schedule will be posted in ways both electronic and written throughout the year.





If you laugh at other people's jokes you will feel better, they will feel better and they will like you more! Finally, laugh at yourself. When you focus your humor on yourself and not on others it would



The Youth Board has a lot of information about youth programs, fun activities, schedules, and a place for prayer requests. Drop by any time and have a look!



INTERNATIONAL MINISTRIES





This is part 2 of a reflective note of the Honduran migration in transit through Guatemala and Mexico to the United States.

Pray for Ricardo Mayol-Bracero regional consultant and for the migrants from Honduras in transit through Guatemala and Mexico to the United States.

Father Mauro Verzeletti, director of Casa del Migrante, in an interview with the newspaper

Prensa Libre on October 20, said that after the war Hondurans, Salvadorans, Guatemalans, Nicaraguans expected the state to be an ally of the neediest, but it established a market model at the service of private initiative. These migrations show that this model was a fiasco. These massive human displacements are the cry of the poor and excluded who no longer endure violence and poverty and who urge for a radical change of model.



- The poor and excluded Honduran migrants shout: examine the complicity of the country to which we intend to go in the placement of illegitimate presidents who violated the popular will and manipulated institutions and laws.
- They shout: take away the security forces from the custodian of the borders, because the army, immigration agents, cross-border police, are united with organized crime and drug trafficking and violate human rights.
- Honduran migrants clamor for health, education, decent employment, land for all.

Let's be vigilant, let's see if there is a political game with these human displacements to influence the elections of the legislative body of the United States in November. Maybe they want to push for a firm hand to crush the Democrats. No wonder they play with human pain for political purposes. Although this a twisted situation, the hope of the kingdom is an awakened people, who hear and live the gospel, and which Christ, the migrant, announces redemptive ways and invites to follow-up. We walk with Him, and we accompany Dulce María and her little daughter and her companions on this pilgrimage. Let us unite in this pilgrimage that undoes damning fences and borders; and like the hairdresser, come and offer ourselves to transform the borders of death into bridges of life.
