From Your Moderator ~

God has blessed FBCS abundantly over these past 32 years with Pastor Jeff as our pastor, spiritual leader and friend. Jeff delayed his retirement out of deep love and faithfulness to provide continual pastoral leadership during the COVID-19 pandemic and allow a smooth transition until our interim pastor arrives. A 'big" retirement celebration will be re-scheduled at a time when we can all be back together in a safe setting in accordance with medical and public health recommendations but it was a joy to picnic with those who were able on June 21st.

As we prepare to welcome our interim pastor, Rev. Sam Brink, and his wife, Marie, on July 8th, let me share a few thoughts about the role of an interim pastor. An intentional interim pastor will perform all of the basic functions of a pastor – worship, preaching, counsel and administration. The interim pastor will be responsive to the most critical issues that face individuals or the church in general, whether it is conflict, growth, healing or the need for change. The unique quality of an intentional interim pastoral ministry is to lead the congregation to face and progress through the five interim ministry focus points:

- Discovering our history: Reviewing how FBCS has been shaped and formed, including typical patterns of making decisions and communicating; conflict; mission, failure and success.
- 2. Discovering our identity: In the here and now, both internally and as perceived by the surrounding community, defining and redefining our sense of purpose and direction.
- 3. Dealing with changes in leadership: Inevitably a change in pastors leads to changes in lay leadership. There will be an opportunity to step up to new responsibilities and reviewing ways of organizing and developing an effective clergy and lay leadership structure.
- 4. Renewing denominational relationships: Connecting with all the relationships and networks a faith community builds beyond itself.
- 5. Preparing for a new pastor: Including tangible practicalities such as finances, housing, and office space, and intangible preparation by letting go to make room for an important new relationship and preparing FBCS with hope and vision for the future.

Pastor Sam is a highly qualified intentional interim minister and has the pastoral skills to both help FBCS recognize the grieving process in the retirement of our beloved pastor after 32 years of pastoral ministry, and also in the loss of seeing each other in person as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. An interim pastor recognizes opportunities for the church to grow, heal, renew and rediscover who we are as a community of faith at FBC Springfield.

May our hearts be open to the healing and leading of the Holy Spirit, as Pastor Sam shepherds us through this time of transition and a new season of ministry in the life of FBCS.

care that encourages our residents, known as Ranchers, to reach their fullest physical, emotional, social and spiritual potential. We strive to provide every opportunity for Ranchers to pursue lives of dignity, purpose and respect". Rainbow Acres employs over 75 people to provide care and teaching for the Ranchers and is licensed by the State of Arizona Department of Health Services. It is governed by an independent, volunteer Board of Trustees and is a member of the American Baptist Home Mission Society, Arizona Chapter of Assisted Living Federation of America, United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries, and several other organizations.

Summer Fruits

Summer fruits give you energy, nutrients, help you cool down and stay hydrated. Fruits can even help reduce heart disease Whenever possible eat the fruit that is in season. Right now some of the berries are still available but there are peaches, plums, melons and soon grapes, apples and pears, just to name a few. In season fruit taste better and have higher nutrition. They are also at their best price.

Locally grown fruits are best. Watermelons are a good choice. Watermelon has a reputation for tasting good but the bonus is that watermelon is high in vitamin A (think eye health) and vitamin C and vitamin B6. It also has a good amount of potassium and lycopene. Did you ever wonder if the seedless variety is genetically modified? They are not they are just a hybrid.
